Bay State Council of Divers

The most recent meeting of the Bay State Council was held on the evening of February 8th at the South Shore Neptunes' clubhouse in Quincy.

Members of the Bay State Council have been working with the Quincy Police department to see about borrowing better camera equipment for doing preliminary surveys of the ocean floor in possible locations for an artificial reef.

The next subject for discussion was the status of the dive industry, noting that numbers of recreational divers are down. The question was raised about how to encourage younger people to take up SCUBA diving and how to incorporate them into dive clubs. The suggestion was made to have "youth memberships" in the dive clubs, and noting that clubs had to be careful not to become baby sitters. The council will plan an "EVENT" to take place in mid-July to introduce young people to SCUBA.

It was noted that the upcoming Sea Rovers Clinic will feature a Kids' Room sponsored by the New England Aquarium and Northeastern University Marine Science Center.

Victor Mastone of the MA Board of Underwater Archeological Resources (BUAR) commented that the eelgrass harvesting and replanting around harbor islands is ongoing. Post pipeline, a site has been permitted for an artificial reef off of Hypocrite Reef. There will be a presentation on this project on Sunday afternoon at Sea Rovers.

Ted Maney of Northeastern University mentioned that a group of students from Northeastern will be trained to instruct members of dive clubs in the identification of invasive species. They will ask for reports from divers, therefore providing for better monitoring of the spread and increase of these species.

Vincent Malkoski of the MA Division of Marine Fisheries gave an update on topics that he and his department are monitoring, including the Cape Wind Farm project. He also brought up the issue of "tickle sticks". He said that at times he is asked the definition of a tickle stick and says there really isn't one, but the queriers are relieved to find that it does not allow for a snare. A legal definition of tickle sticks may be written into the MA state laws in the near future.

The next meeting of the Bay State Council will be held on Wednesday, May 3rd, at 7:30 PM, at the Neptunes' clubhouse in Quincy at the corner Quarry and Joyce Streets.

NEU Marine Science Center Evening Lecture Series

The Northeastern University Marine Science Center holds a series of lectures on Tuesdays at their location in Nahant, 7-8:30PM. A few Froggies went to the presentation on February 7th by Dr. Joe Buttner and Jack Grundstrom on "Sustainable Aquaculture of Softshell Clams on Massachusetts' North Shore". The topic was very interesting from both the biological/culture viewpoint and from the ecological viewpoint. Besides, the clams were delicious!!!

March 14th — "Ten Hours From Dawn: A True Story of Heroism and Tragedy aboard the Can **Do**" by Michael Tougias.

During the height of the Blizzard of 1978 the pilot boat *Can Do*, with five men aboard, set out from Gloucester to assist a lost Coast Guard boat and an oil tanker that was in Mayday situation. *Ten Hours Until Dawn* tells the story of what happened on that awful night when the seas were producing monstrous waves of 40 ft and the wind was screaming at 100 mph."

Michael Tougias is the author of 15 books including his latest book, *Ten Hours Until Dawn*. Using slides of the boats, the men involved, and photos of the storm, Tougias will take the viewer through this incredible night where many lives hung in the balance.

STELLWAGEN BANK NATIONAL MARINE SANCTUARY MANAGEMENT PLAN REVISION

CHANGES PROPOSED HERE SHOULD BE OF GRAVE CONCERN TO THE DIVING COMMUNITY!

A revision to the 1993 Management Plan regulating Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary is presently underway. It is expected to be released for public comment in the spring of 2006. In mid 2004, a Maritime Heritage Resources Action Plan (AP) was approved and released, which makes recommendations that will form the basis of the revised management plan. It is our position that the Action Plan does not address the needs of the dive community and does not afford appropriate access to shipwrecks in the bank. We object to any subsequent management plan that incorporates recommendations derived from the Action Plan.

In general, the Action Plan describes and recommends a 3-tier classification for shipwrecks. To briefly summarize:

- Discovery Phase site can be held for an indefinite period of time before site is classified as "restricted" or "public"
- Restricted Access No access without a special use permit
- Public Access Mandatory notification of planned visits

These recommendations carry with it other provisions – such as exclusion zones up to one square mile around the site, no use of anchoring devices to secure a line to the wreck – and others. Full details describing this classification system can be found at http://shipwreckdivers.org/NOAA action plan.shtml.

It is our position that this type of management is unacceptable and inappropriately limits access to resources that belong to the public. Our position can be summarized as follows:

- We reject the proposed classification system for maritime heritage resources (e.g. shipwreck sites) in its entirety, including the stipulations attached to each designation, (as outlined in the Action Plan and any management plan derived from it). The classification system proposed in the MHR Action Plan is too restrictive on access; it is highly subjective, with many shipwreck sites likely to become restricted from public access. For example, even "public access" shipwreck sites call for an inappropriate level of monitoring.
- Newly discovered shipwreck sites should be studied; however, without a time limit on the assessment period of newly discovered shipwreck sites, a site can be withheld from the public indefinitely. This is unfair and unnecessary. Newly discovered shipwreck sites must be inventoried in a timely manner and subsequently shared with the public, which means facilitating access.
- If anchoring and use of ground tackle on shipwreck sites is to be prohibited, then the sanctuary must make a commitment to establish and maintain mooring buoys on wrecks likely to host regular visitation. With no mooring buoy present, divers must be permitted to secure a line to the wreck. Buoys can be maintained in collaboration with local commercial charter operators.
- The use of remote sensing gear and ROVs must be permitted. Exploration and discovery must not be compromised, as many of the known shipwreck sites in SBNMS were discovered through privately funded and organized research using remote sensing equipment.
- Bidding for concessionaire permits will be cost prohibitive to commercial operations wishing to visit certain Sanctuary wrecks. Commercial and/or private operations should not be required to bid for permits.

We are asking the dive community to become involved in this important process. It is critical that the dive community be aware of the changes that are taking place here and proactively participate in the process to ensure that our concerns are heard and that our interests are represented. How can this be done?



MUSSELS!!

My diving buddy and I used to take mussels by the bushel right around White Beach and cook them right on the "work barge". It's pretty simple.

5 lb. of mussels

6 cloves of crushed garlic


- 1 lb of butter
- 3 bottles of any beer.

Debeard the mussels, wash and clean in water. Melt the butter in a pot able to hold all the mussels. When butter is melted, sauté the garlic until softened, 3 to 4 minutes. This is done on med. to high heat. Toss in the mussels; pour in the beer and cover. Cook on high heat for 6 to 7 minutes. The mussels should be open. Discard any that are not.

Pop open a cold one and enjoy with crunchy French bread. **Enjoy!!**
