President's Message

Greetings Fellow Froggies,

Well, another month has quickly passed by, winter is over and we can look forward to the warmth of spring. Spring brings with it raking leaves, sweeping the sand off our driveways and looking at the exterior of our houses, wondering when we are going to have time to paint all those ugly peelings.

Spring is also the time we, as divers, get the itch of getting wet and enjoy a world most people can only imagine. Some of us tend to embellish our dives. We've all been there, getting up early, driving to our favorite beach, the big hassle of gearing up, getting in the water, swimming around for an hour or so. What do we see? The same sandy bottom, a few hermit crabs and maybe a flounder looking at us wondering who or what we are. What do we tell our non-diving friends when we get back? When you completed the Open Water Diver course, we taught you how to breathe under water and take care of you. Now it might be a time to learn how to really take care of your buddy in an emergency.

On April 13th, we will sponsor a C.P.R. course for our members. If this course is completed, it will fulfill part of the Rescue Course requirements. This is a skill all divers should have training in. Some people will tell you it doesn't work. I know of two people in the little burg of Manchester who are still with us after C.P.R. was performed on them. One was a 9-month-old infant

and the other a 36-year-old woman. I was the one who performed the C.P.R. The little girl right now is 28 with twin boys. The woman is 61 and lives two doors down. You'll have a hard time convincing me (and them) that it doesn't work.

So take the time this spring and sharpen those skills that might have gotten rusty over the fall and winter months. We have instructors in the club that are more than qualified to teach these skills. Visit your favorite dive store and see about classes. Now is the time to think about a good dive season and having a safe and enjoyable summer of diving.

I would like to thank Amy Mauer for setting up the Invasive Invertebrate Identification Class on March 16th. It was very informative. I would like to nominate Amy as Member of the Month. For all those who assisted, thank you.

We should all be very thankful to Bob Boyle of Under Sea Divers for his continued support of the NSF. His donation of the Poseidon BCD was very generous and was well-received at the Sea Rovers Show. Thanks again Bob!

EFR Instructor Course

I will be conducting an Emergency First Response Instructor Course on April 29th/30th in Stoneham, MA. The course will run 9-5 both days. EFR Instructor training is no longer restricted to PADI members, so divers certified with other agencies may sign up. The course includes training in CPR/First Aid for both adults and infants/children, AED use, and oxygen use.

The cost is \$350 if you are current with adult CPR/First Aid as well as infant/child CPR/First Aid. If you need a refresher for either, cost is \$375; if you need both, then cost is \$400. This includes all provider and instructor materials including choice of DVD or video. It does not include the EFR application fee (\$68) which is paid directly to EFR.

There is pre-work required, so please sign up no later than April 15th, so I have time to ship you out the materials and homework assignments.

If you are currently an EFR instructor but are not a Care for Children Instructor, you may take just the Care for Children Instructor program.

That will run on Sunday, April 30th from 9:00 am to 1:00 pm.

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Boston Sea Rovers 52nd Annual Underwater Clinic

The annual Boston Sea Rovers event includes workshops and training sessions, seminars on a wide range of topics, and exhibits by equipment providers and local dive clubs. The Saturday evening film festival is the highlight of the weekend. In all, 19 NSF members attended the event this year. Some, like Dave Metrano, refreshed their training certifications. Others attended seminars on photography, videography, underwater research activities or investigations of shipwrecks. Some just roamed the exhibit area examining the latest in underwater gear.

Among the exhibitors on the balcony overlooking the exhibit floor were the dive clubs. The North Shore Frogmen's booth was prominent among them. Thirteen club members supported the booth by contributing to the display or greeting people that visited the booth. Pictures from the Club's photo contest were on display along with a large lobster claw permanently dedicated by Rich Kinkade to the Sea Rovers Booth. Daryl Findlay's Swedish Fish were also a major attraction as was his slide presentation, which played continuously at one of the tables. NSF Flyers and copies of the current issue of Air Bubbles were available to visitors. Half pint water bottles with the Club name and logo were distributed to those that came by the booth thirsty.

Eighteen people signed our guest book of which 5 are new divers (less than 5 years experience). Other guests included former club members and people who may be future speakers at our dive club meetings. A couple of experienced divers moving to the Boston area were looking for clubs to join. Dave Dodge tried to pay his dues at the booth, as had been his custom for the past several years, but as a new Life Member no dues were due. Captain Dave was given his life member award.

A Poseidon BeSea W50 buoyancy compensation vest was donated by Bob Boyle of Undersea Divers to be raffled off over the weekend. Over 40 people participated in the raffle raising \$328. Bill McGee of Buzzards Bay, MA was the winner. Wayne Bedore, last year's winner, played again this year – maybe hoping lighting would strike twice.

The highlight of the weekend is the Saturday evening

film festival. Prominent underwater cinematographers discussed their most recent projects and showed clips from some of their work. Dr. Phil Nuytten was awarded Diver of the Year as one of the pioneers of the modern commercial diving industry.

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ICE DIVING

Now is my chance, the icing on the cake, the victory lap. I invert myself under the ice, my fins flat against the ice, and give 2 quick tugs to tell the surface support that I am ready to skate. They return the sign, 2 tugs back, and off I go! The guys race away from the freshly cut hole pulling the brightly colored rope that is securely fastened to my waist, and I glide through the wintry, frigid water. The large triangularly cut hole is in sight. 100 feet has quickly flown by, my crew huffing and puffing as they scramble back to help me up from the dark waters. My wet face is instantly exposed to the sub zero temperatures, my dry suit immediately freezes into a sheet of ice, and my hair is a massive cluster of icicles. Don, my surface support, quickly submerges my cold hands into the hotter, and I can feel them tingling as the blood rushes into them. I am now back on the ice; my first ice diving experience turned out to be a blast.



But, as you know, victory laps only come after the hard work is done, although "hard" is relative and subjective. From this experience I learned a ton. Everything from where to set ice screws, to what the most effective knots are, to rescuing missing people, and the necessary safety procedures. Between ice cutting, drilling techniques, and splicing ropes I had a weekend filled with facts and precautions. One aspect of the class that was learned, and not taught was

camaraderie. My safety was dependent on my partner's awareness and knowledge; I will in return give my full attention while my partner is underwater.



Although the water was cold, deflator valves stuck, and wet masks quickly became permanent fixtures of the ice once set down, the air was fresh, the beautiful pines stood along the lake like soldiers at attention watching us indulge. Friendships were formed, diving skills were broadened, and despite the -30° temps, diving is diving. I'll take it in any form.

NSF Website Planning

Our NSF Website will be undergoing a make-over. We are currently in the planning stages. Two meetings have been held, and a third is planned.

In our first meeting ten club members gathered to define the goals and objectives of the website and answer the questions: who visits the website? and what needs must the website meet? We discussed who our audience is by identifying club members, non-member divers and non-divers. We identified the different needs each group has when they logon to the website, including schedule / activity information, diving activities, club information, diving resource information, member information and general information. Using a consensus building technique, the group identified that meeting the needs of the club members and providing schedule and activity information was the most important goal of the website. That does not mean that the other visitors to the website are unimportant and the needs of non-club members do not need to be met. In fact, the needs of nonclub members are important in attracting new members to the club. However, this meeting highlighted the importance of meeting the needs of the club members and having current schedule and activity information.

In the second meeting, five club members gathered to discuss how the information on the website should be organized and who (by club officer or committee chair) is responsible for keeping the website content current. This meeting was highlighted by taking the information on the needs of the visitors to the website developed from the previous meeting and grouping the information logically. The club officers or committee chairs responsible for providing and updating the needed information were identified.

We still have much to discuss before the NSF Website is upgraded. Those that have participated in the above meetings have worked hard to reach a common vision as to what the website should become. If you have comments or ideas as to how to improve the club website, feel free to share them with the club officers or the webmaster.

Dear Boston Sea Rovers Annual Clinic Attendees:

Thank you for the opportunity to explain the Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary management plan review process. We understand that this process is generating a lot of interest while creating some confusion among your readers.

Stellwagen Bank is a special place that includes many exciting diving opportunities. Congress established the Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary in 1992 because it recognized the area's extraordinary national significance and the importance of protecting the sanctuary's living and non-living (e.g., maritime heritage resources, including shipwrecks) marine resources.

Under the National Marine Sanctuaries Act, the Secretary of Commerce, through the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), is directed to enhance the public's awareness, understanding, and appreciation of the sanctuary's maritime heritage resources, and to facilitate uses compatible with the primary mandate of protecting these important resources. Under sanctuary regulations, greater protection is required for these resources than those in surrounding federal waters.

Congress also requires NOAA to develop and periodically review sanctuary management plans. NOAA's National Marine Sanctuary Program (NMSP) initiated the first management plan review for Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary in 2002 with public meetings and input. Over 20,000 comments were received, including comments directed at improving management of the sanctuary's maritime heritage resources.

Public comments identified three needs with respect to the maritime heritage resources within the sanctuary:

- 1) A resource inventory and assessment;
- A resource management and protection plan; and
- 3) Improved efforts to educate the public about the maritime heritage resources in the sanctuary.

In response, the Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary Advisory Council convened a Maritime

Heritage Resources Working Group to advise the NMSP on the management plan review. The Working Group included representatives of marine science, fishing, conservation, historic preservation and diving interests. This group formulated an action plan to realize the program's goal of resource protection while allowing for compatible uses.

Examples of their recommendations include the establishment of mooring buoys on appropriate sites to facilitate access to sites while avoiding anchor damage, as well as recommending targeted outreach to divers about the sanctuary's maritime heritage resources.

This plan was reviewed and approved by the Sanctuary Advisory Council before being forwarded to the NMSP. The action plan was prepared as advice to the program, and recommendations are currently being evaluated. Consequently, NOAA has not yet released the Draft Management Plan for public comment. However, it is not NOAA's intention to close the entire sanctuary, or all of its shipwreck sites to divers.

I encourage readers to learn more about the Sanctuary and how NOAA works with the public to protect this special place by visiting our web site (http://www.stellwagen.noaa.gov) or by contacting the sanctuary office.

The Draft Management Plan will be released by NOAA for public review and comment in Spring, 2006. Multiple forums for public comment will be held, where divers and interested citizens may offer additional comments about the Draft Management Plan before it is finalized. NOAA will notify the New England diving community and other media of the dates when the public comment period will be open so that all may respond.

NOAA views divers as an important sanctuary constituency, and is committed to addressing their interests during revision of the Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary Management Plan.

Recipe Corner



Mahi-Mahi with

Creamed Corn and Fried Green Tomatoes

This fish dish was obtained from the Green Parrot restaurant on Bonaire before it was blown into the sea. It was a favorite of mine and I thank head cook, bottle washer and friend Allen Powell for supplying the recipe to me. It's simple to make; the Mahi-mahi can be purchased at just about any fish market. I've purchased it many times at *Rowan's Sea Food* at the Beverly-Salem Bridge.

(NOTE: Mahi-mahi is also known as dolphin. It's the fish, not the mammal. Flipper is still alive and well.)

Ingredients:

2 cans of creamed corn

4 6-ounce mahi-mahi fillets

2 tablespoons of olive oil

½ cup dry white wine

8 slices Fried Green Tomatoes

Cut tart green tomatoes into ¾ inch-thick slices; season them with salt and pepper and dredge in corn meal. Fry in a heavy pan in peanut oil until brown on both sides. This should take about 1 minute on each side. Drain well on paper.

Season the fish on both sides with salt and pepper. In the same skillet, brown the fish in olive oil for 3 or 4 minutes. Turn it over and continue to cook for another 2 minutes. Remove the fish and drain the oil out of the pan. Add the white wine and deglaze the pan. Add the fish and creamed corn and finish cooking for another minute.

Serve with the crisp Fried Tomatoes. An ice-cold tea makes this go down real smooth. For those who don't like tea, Foster's works well also.
