Once Upon a Dive Nuclear Diving (101) By Jack Munro

The first Commercial Nuclear Power Generating stations went on line in 1958 (Froggys, too). The stations were at the Shipping Port in Pennsylvania and Yankee Rowe in Rowe, Massachusetts. These first power plants were Pressurized Water Reactors, nearly the same as what the Navy Nuclear Powered submarines had.

The exception between these power plants, Navy and Commercial, was that the Navy ran their plants only when at sea and at power levels as needed. By doing so, the Navy reactor, like the ship I was on, lasted 3 years and 10 months before refueling was necessary. By contrast, the commercial reactors would last 1½ to 2 years before refueling.

This brings us to diving inside spent fuel pools, where the fuel rods that are taken out of the reactor are stored. Prior to the 1970s, all fuel rods in spent fuel pools were reprocessed, which meant they were moved via special containers to reprocessing plants where 40 to 60% of the fuel bundles were recovered for reuse. This meant that less U-235 had to be processed, thus cutting down on the amount to get rid of.

Diving in these fuel pools is not like what regular commercial divers do. It's very procedurally similar to an astronaut going into space. All dive gear is cleaned and tested prior to going in, then rechecked several times after being put together to insure it is clean and working properly. All personnel are schooled at the plant for 5 to 8 days before being allowed into the pool area. Then, Health Physics (medically trained in Nuclear medicine and procedures) run all safety procedures before, during, and after diving. All divers are tested by a Body Count machine. Urine and stool samples are taken, as well as food and water intake, etc., before going in. All of the testing is done again before you leave the plant.

Diving is done using surface supplied air from inhouse compressors or company compressors via volume tank and filter systems and 1 or 2 large HP bottles are used for back up air. All compressors are external to fuel pool unless using house air. Then, they are covered to prevent any possibility of contamination by any source. Tanks, manifolds, and diver radios are kept at the fringes of the diving operations, are covered with plastic, and taped up in order to keep the gear contamination to a minimum.

A Ben Miller Helmet was the diving choice, because of the rugged construction, which includes:

- Monolithic cast bronze
- tilt valve demand regulator

- oral nasal exhaust valve configuration
- 5/16th inch lexan windshield
- neck dam

The Viking suit which is made of Hypalong material is very rugged and easy to clean and less prone to contamination. This combination, plus the first use of the cuff ring on hands in 1978 and the shoulder entry zipper and no valves on the suit made Viking a good deal for contaminated water use. After the shoulder zipper is closed, we connected the helmet neck dam directly to the Viking neck piece. This allowed us to have a single piece connected to the helmet. All this made it 90% easier to keep contamination from getting inside the helmet.

The pictures above and below this text show this diver wearing a Ben Miller helmet and Viking suit with wrist rings, multiple gloves, valves, and harness (not used after this job). Also, the neck entry has been replaced with shoulder entry. This job required divers to enter the water with tools and equipment. A staging was used here which made it easier to clean the diver before the helmet and suit were removed.



Why are we in spent fuel pools where they store used or spent fuel rods from a nuclear reactor? The following jobs answer this question:

- Yankee Rowe: This seven week job consisted of dividing the fuel pool in half. A 5 ton stainless steel bracket was installed using a hydraulic drill and anchor bolts in the walls and floor of the pool after which we epoxy-injected glue behind the bracket to fill the voids.
- <u>Florida Power</u>: A one month job consisting of cutting and removing old fuel racks and cleanup of high radiation waste.
- <u>Salem Generating Station Number One</u>: This one-and-a-half week job was to find a stainless steel wall leak, seal it with epoxy, and prep for welding-U/W.
- <u>Salem Generating Station Number Two</u>: In this one-and-a-half week job, we moved fuel racks and installed monitoring equipment in the pool.
- <u>Peach Bottom Station Number Two</u>: In this one month job, we installed a new filter system and removed the old from the Taurus area.


When the diver is dressed for diving, he wears plant-issued clothing under the Viking suit and on each arm and leg of these underclothes, he wears a dosimeter (an instant reading of high-rad areas) and a T.L.D. (a thermal luminescent dosimeter, which has four windows: alpha, beta, gamma, and neutron radiation). Also, inside the windshield of the helmet, he wears a chirper (another instant reading dosimeter, which has an audible alarm). The four packets of dosimeters and T.L.D.s, as well as the chirper, protect the diver, both while he is in the water and from the total NRC-exposure limits.

The first time the chirper was desperately needed was at Florida Power. There, I encountered a high-radiation source, which I removed from the water using a bucket and a stick. Because I was in the water, my exposure was very low. However, when the bucket reached the surface, the bottom of the bucket offered no shielding and subsequently set off all the alarms in the building.

Before the helmet is removed, the diver is dried and checked with a radiation meter.

When the diver completes his dive, he is washed with de-mineralized water. Then, he is completely wiped down until dry. Next, he is checked by health physics personnel with a Geiger counter and swipes to ensure he is radiation-clean. Afterward, the tenders remove the helmet with clean gloves. The helmet is checked, inside and out, and stored in a plastic bag at the site. The diver is helped out of the suit with clean gloves and the suit is stored after rechecks.

After the job is over, the helmet, suit, weight belts, etc., are checked for fixed-contamination. If they are found to be over the NRC limits, they must stay at the power plant. Eleven helmets, sixteen suits, hoses, and weight belts are still at power plants up and down the Eastern seaboard. This gear is in usable condition awaiting our return.

In a few weeks, if the Froggy readers want it after this article is published, I will bring in more photos, paperwork, film badge, and possibly a helmet for show-and-tell and a question-and-answer period.
