Dear Froggies,

Thank you for the warm reception we received at the last meeting. Many of you know we have been traveling around the beautiful U.S. of A and Canada since October of 1997. We traveled in a 30' Winnebago that served as our home and transportation. After fourteen months, we have suspended our travels, due to family obligations. After adjusting to the abrupt stop in travels, and now stationery lifestyle, John is managing Northeast Scuba in North Reading, and I will resume sewing and gluing repairs for drysuits and wetsuits.

We would love to share some of our travel experiences with you. We took some photos poor quality compared to the wonders I've seen from other club members, but they provide memories for us. We borrowed a video camera for two of the five months while we were in British Columbia. Unfortunately, there was a problem with the tracking during recording. We intend to fix and salvage as much of the videos as possible. If they are recoverable, we would love to show the diving with hundreds of white sided dolphins; orcas doing the "wild thing;" a humpback whale's full breach; playing with the wolf eels; octopus; eagles catching fish in their talons; black bear strolling along the shore with their cub; totem poles; sunsets and the beautiful scenery of the inside passage after one of the club meetings.

Our travels across the U.S. included spelunking in Angels Showers, Carlsbad Caverns and Bonne Terre Mines; climbing to the heights of the Cliff Dwellings in New Mexico; jumping off the dunes in White Sands National Park; hiking to the upper falls through eight feet of snow in Yosemite; driving between giant redwood trees in Sequoia National Forest; watching "Old Faithful" blow in Yellowstone; seeing the most blossoms ever in the Anza Borrego Desert; watching a nail-biting high school rodeo in Yuma; the lights and extravagance of Las Vegas; diving in the California kelp; the awe of the turquoise water and rugged cliffs of Oregon; and I must not forget the ski slopes of the Rockies and Mammoth Mountain. New Year's Day Dive

New Year's Day dawned bright and clear, with the air temperature a balmy 19⁰ F. We all met at Pebble Beach, and watched as 30 knot winds

and heavy surf pounded the beach. The wind chill was way below zero, and spray from the surf was freezing on the shore. A unanimous decision was made to move the dive to Loblolly Cove. There, behind the point, we were in the lee of the wind and found a comfortable site from which to base our operations.

While the beach crew set up the propane stoves and folding tables, we got into our gear. Marianne D'Aquila, Rob Falk, Rick Stemegna, Roz Smith, Mike Denneler, and myself all had to step over ice and ankle breaker boulders to enter the water. Since Mike only snorkeled, we counted 5-1/2 divers.

We found the water temperature was 38°, and visibility was around 20 to 25 feet. Marianne and I saw several large sculpins, and I actually caught my first lobster of the year, but it was so pathetic looking, missing some legs and both claws, I let it go. I counted at least two species of nudibranchs, and enjoyed watching as thousands of tiny shrimp darted among the seaweed and rocks of the bottom. The only real "downer" of the day was when the zipper on Roz's dry suit failed, flooding the suit, and making her a tad bit chilly.

After all divers were recovered, we feasted on grilled chicken and steak tips, toasting the New Year with the traditional libations, and enjoying a long story session. This was my first New Year's Day Dive with the Northshore Frogmen, and I plan on making it a longstanding tradition. A truly enjoyable way to start off the New Year!

RECIPE CORNER

PROVENCAL FISH SOUP

2-pound cod or haddock filets, cut into 2 inch chunks

4 tbls olive oil

4 cloves garlic, minced

2 cups leeks, white part rinsed and sliced

1 tbls. dried basil

pinch saffron

2 tsp. fennel seed

1 bay leaf

_ tsp. red pepper flakes, crushed

32 oz. can peeled tomatoes

8 cups fish or chicken stock

1 cup dry white wine

1 tbls. sugar

_ tsp. salt

Juice or grated rind of _ orange

2 tbls. tomato paste

Heat oil, add garlic, cook. Add leeks and cook about 4 minutes.

Add next 5 ingredients. Add tomatoes, broken up, stock, wine, sugar and salt.

Heat to simmer. In bowl, combine orange juice, rind and paste. Add to soup.

Simmer 15 minutes. Stir in fish. Cook 5 minutes. Remove bay leaf and enjoy!

DEMA '99

I recently attended DEMA '99 with fellow Froggies John McColley, Jeannie Rahilly, Faith Ortins, and Al Morris. DEMA (Diving Equipment and Marketing Association) holds an annual trade show where you can see all the newest dive gear, latest travel locations, and basically network with other folks in the dive industry. This year, it was held in New Orleans, which is always one of my favorite places.

In the new and interesting gear department, DUI was selling a new, low-end suit. It's made out of the same material as the TLS-350, but has very few bells and whistles and is at a much lower price. People continue to go nuts over the rock boots – it's amazing how such a simple idea works out so well. OMS is selling some new, smaller low pressure steel tanks. They used to sell 13 cubic foot and 46 cubic foot tanks. They've now added a 7.8 and a 19, both of which could be very useful. A lot of manufacturers were selling drysuits of some type. It looks like drysuits are finally mainstream even for locations that traditionally have been wetsuit areas.

There were more rebreathers at this show than I could count. The prices are coming down, but barriers like the availability of the training and a

host of other issues still prevent them from becoming totally mainstream.

DAN as usual had their new accident statistics book out. They're also selling a "rebreather" kit for their oxygen unit. It's supposed to extend the life of the oxygen cylinder from about an hour to over six hours. It sounds good for off-shore use, although I think most people just tend to take extra cylinders if they'll be out of range for very long. It's still disturbing how many oxygen instructors and providers have been trained, yet still only about 1/3rd of all accident victims get oxygen first aid quickly. Seeing how dramatically it can improve the eventual outcome in a dive accident, it's disappointing the number is still so low.

Consolidation in the dive industry continues. It was interesting to see that even though the company that owns ScubaPro also bought Uwatec (the computer manufacturer), the two organizations still didn't seem very integrated. They did, however, have a very snazzy and expensive booth. PADI won the prize for the loudest shirts. Their booth was decorated like a circus with all balloons and popcorn machine, etc.

I did three seminars for DUI on how to train divers at all levels using drysuits. Unlike last year where a lot of people attended wondering if it were a good idea, this year they came knowing they wanted to do it, but just wanted to know how.

All in all, it was a great show. It's a great chance to see the latest products and visit with folks who you don't get to see very often. And New Orleans is always a great location!
