BOAT DIVING

With boating season approaching, I thought it would be appropriate to reprint an article from the May 1987 Air Bubbles.

The following is a list of suggested do's and don'ts for guests on boat dives.

Before:

- 1. If the weather is questionable, sea conditions may be even poorer so call the boat operator to see if the trip is on. Call also if for any reason, you cannot go.
- 2. To avoid seasickness don't eat greasy, heavy foods beforehand. Do eat something because an empty stomach may also cause seasickness.
- 3. Double check to see that all diving gear is packed.
- 4. Bring only tanks with boots.
- 5. Boat diving takes longer, makes one hungrier, thirstier and colder than shore diving so bring food, drinks and extra clothing.
- 6. On the open sea, especially in open boats, exposure from the sun is greater because of reflection. Bring sunscreen, sunglasses and possibly a hat.
- 7. Space and weight are important considerations aboard boats. Bring only the gear you need to dive safely and comfortably. Bring your duplicate gear on shore dives but not on boat dives.
- 8. If you have to be back at a specific time, don't go!
- 9. Show up on time.

During:

- Stow gear according to the captain's instructions. Don't bang tanks and weight belts around.
- 2. If seasick, stare at a point on the horizon, take motion sickness pills and eat something light if hungry.
- 3. Don't drink or smoke without the captain's permission.
- 4. Follow the captain's instruction before entering or exiting the water.

Before entering the water:

- 1. Check your gear.
- 2. Make sure your air is turned on
- 3. Inflate your BCD
- 4. Press mask and regulator against your face while entering
- 5. Lastly, look to see that no person or object is in your way

After:

1. Disembark with your gear and your trash.

Florida Lobster Cassoulet with Saffron Rouille

As I have mentioned at a few club meetings, I have set my ReplayTV (like a Tivo, only better!) to record any cooking show that features lobster. I have tried many excellent recipes – some simple and some quite complicated. This one is one of my favorites. As you all know, Maine lobster is superior to Florida lobster, and works just fine in this dish. The Saffron Rouille is a nice addition, but not really necessary if you think it's too much work or mess, but be sure to not skip the crostini! *Rob Falk*

Chef: Marty Blitz, Restaurant: Mise en Place, Tampa, Fla. Serves 4

Cassoulet

1/4 cup olive oil

1 clove garlic, chopped

1 onion, finely diced

1 carrot, finely diced

1 stalk celery, finely diced

2 sprigs fresh thyme, chopped

1 bay leaf

2 tablespoons tomato paste

1/4 cup dry white wine

4 cups white beans, cooked

3 to 4 cups lobster stock

Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

Saffron Rouille

Pinch of saffron

1 tablespoon hot water

2 eggs

Pinch of cayenne

1 teaspoon Dijon mustard

1 tablespoon lemon juice

1 cup olive oil

Salt and freshly ground white pepper to taste

Crostini

1 loaf French or Italian bread

2 tablespoons olive oil

1 sprig parsley, stemmed and chopped

Lobster

7- to 8-ounces lobster meat Salt and freshly ground black pepper to taste

1 tablespoon olive oil

1 clove garlic, minced

1/4 cup dry white wine

Garnish & Service

1 tomato, peeled, seeded and diced

2 sprigs parsley, stemmed and chopped

4 sprigs thyme

To make the cassoulet: Heat the olive oil in a medium pot over medium-high heat and sauté the garlic until golden brown and soft. Add the onion, celery, carrots, thyme and bay leaf and cook 5 minutes. Stir in the tomato paste and cook 5 minutes. Add the white wine and cook until the liquid has reduced by half. Add the lobster stock and beans and cook until the stock is almost all absorbed. Season to taste. Keep warm.

To make the rouille: Place the saffron in the tablespoon of hot water to dissolve. Place the eggs, cayenne, mustard and lemon juice in a blender and process on high speed. Slowly add the oil in a small stream, continuing to process. When the oil has been incorporated and the mixture has thickened, add the saffron and water. Adjust seasoning with salt and pepper.

To make the crostini: Preheat the broiler to high. Slice the bread diagonally into 8 thick slices. Place the bread slices on a baking sheet and drizzle with olive oil. Broil until crisp and brown. Remove and sprinkle with parsley.

To prepare the lobster: Cut the lobster meat into large chunks. Season with salt and pepper. Heat the tablespoon of olive oil in a large sauté pan over medium heat and add the lobster meat and garlic. Sauté until the garlic is translucent and the lobster has warmed. Add the wine and cook until the liquid has nearly all evaporated. Mix in 4 large spoonfuls of cassoulet and set aside.

To serve: Divide the cassoulet among 4 large serving bowls. Spoon the lobster mixture in the center of each. Sprinkle with chopped tomato. Lean two crostini against the inside rim of each bowl. Drizzle the cassoulet and crostini with rouille and sprinkle with chopped parsley. Garnish each with a sprig of thyme.

Diving in Ft. Lauderdale

(or "How to Know When to Bag a Dive")

After doing much searching on the Internet and talking with other divers, I made Pro Dive my dive shop of choice. They have a nice dive shop right off A1A (Ocean Drive) in Ft. Lauderdale.

I was very impressed with the personnel. In all the dives I have done, they were the only ones who actually wanted to check my logbook. We were doing a dive to the wreck of the "Tracy" and they wanted to be sure that I had that kind of experience. Also, Pro Dive requires that you have blown bubbles within the last 18 months. If not, they will require you to take a refresher course before heading out on the boat.

After checking in, go around the corner to the equipment shed. They will set you up with anything you have requested when you checked in. Myself, I needed a wetsuit and a weight belt. I got a 3-mil farmer john for the day's dives. Now for the weight belt. At the equipment shed, they give you just the belt. The weights are added onboard. Doing some quick math, I know in full 7mm dress for Cape Ann, I use 34 pounds. In Mexico (2mil shorty) I needed only 12 pounds. So I figured I would need about 24 pounds for the farmer john. This is where I should have stuck to my convictions because the divemaster said I only needed 16 pounds. This would turn out to be a bad thing. I think that since the boat was full, they didn't have enough weights to go around. There were a couple of divers doing rebreathers and they said that some weights were borrowed off the boat.

Once everybody got onboard the Pro Dive II, we started heading out to the "Tracy" some 50 minutes away. When we were almost there, the captain gave the dive briefing and started buddying up divers. Once anchored, I had an uneasy feeling about the first dive. Waves were running four to six feet. Another problem was the dive master wanted us to go down as soon as we hit the water. That doesn't agree with me because I need time to equalize. To make things worse, I was to be the first one off the boat.

As soon as I hit the water, I headed over to the anchor line and started down. About 15 feet down, I noticed my air was quite moist. In fact, I was getting alot of water with every breath. Also, it seemed that I had to work for every bit of air out of my regulator. Trying to hang onto the anchor line, I was being flapped around like a flag in the breeze. On top of it, the equalization aspect of the dive wasn't going very well. There I was; down at 25 feet with another 50 to go, having a hard time getting waterlogged air out of my tank, and literally trying to pull myself down the anchorline. Looking up, I could see a long line of black wetsuits wondering what was going on. So feeling waves of anxiety, I remembered that if it doesn't feel

right, don't do it. Incredibly disappointed, I gave the thumbs up and signaled that I would sit out the first dive. Better to be very disappointed then to be very dead. I figured if I was having this much trouble at 25 feet, no telling what was waiting for me at the bottom.

While on the boat, I managed to fix the problem with the air drag. I had the reg set to max resistance. Not good. When everybody was back on the boat talking about the big five-foot barracuda that I missed cruising the wreck, we pulled anchor and headed to dive spot 2, the Florida Caves. The Florida Caves aren't really caves at all. It is a big open reef with lots of nooks and crannies filled with fish. Thought I would have an easier time with this dive.

Over the side and dropped down to 30 feet. The regulator was still flooding so I switched to my backup. The thinking was that if I did have a problem at this depth, I could easily do a controlled emergency ascent to the surface. Once I switched regs, I had a very enjoyable second dive. Lots of different kinds of life. There were rods that looked like they were dancing up and down. Blue tangs and parrot fish would pass by. All around was the sound of the parrots munching on the coral. I saw a couple of puffers and an amazing cow fish. Looks just like a puffer except it has two spikes on the top of his forehead.

Around 1000 pounds of air, the weight belt became an issue again. With almost no air in my BCD, I had to literally fight to stay on the bottom. I managed to stay down for 45 minutes and then, no longer able to counteract Mr. Archimedes and his law, I drifted leisurely up to the surface.

Getting back on the boat with the seas the way they were was a real experience. I had to time it just right so my feet hit the bottom run on the "valley" of the wave. I thought I was going to be catapulted over the bow as the next wave rolled by.

So what did I come away with:

If it doesn't feel good, don't do it. Nobody is going to ridicule you for bagging a dive. If they do, just cross them off your short list of available divers.

If you have your reg serviced, go to a pool and check it out before that not-too-often-in-a-lifetime dive!

Personal experience is worth more than another's opinion. I wish I had been more determined in the weight belt issue.

My impression with Pro Dive? Excellent. The very fact that they looked at logbooks tells me they want divers on board; not just people who go diving. I would definitely hop on their boat next time I am in Ft. Lauderdale!


