President's Message

A terrible tragedy has struck the diving community. While on a diving vacation in Belize, 17 divers from the Richmond Dive Club of Richmond, Virginia, perished when their dive boat sunk as Hurricane Iris hit them. Their boat was tied up in a protected area well before the category 4 hurricane struck. Apparently the guests were encouraged to stay aboard until the hurricane passed.

As a majority of our members travel to many exotic dive locations around the globe, we also are attracted to the great vacation deals available during the hurricane season. I do not believe that the events described above are very likely on these trips and would certainly support taking these late summer and early fall travel deals. I think that most of these trips wind up with great weather and diving. For those that don't, the usual outcome is merely less than perfect diving conditions.

From my experiences with hurricanes and owning property in the Virgin Islands, I've mistakenly thought that it was common knowledge for all in an area threatened by a hurricane, to get high and dry before a strike occurs. I have learned too many times this is not the case. Most loss of life in every hurricane that I have had personal knowledge of has been to boaters. Most of those deaths were people in boats that were



Diving Joy in St. Croix

About a 30 minute bi-plane ride south of Puerto Rico and St. John lies the U.S. island of St. Croix. A 21 mile long igneous extrusion in the Carribean chain. We had chosen a small mom & pop type of lodging called The Cane Bay Reef Club as opposed to the normal resort, mega hotel, which proved a good choice. After a challenging drive to our motel along hair-pin turns and a huge mid-island mountain cheerfully referred to as "THE BEAST", we arrived, smoking brakes et al to our destination. Good accommodations, not luxurious, but spectacular ocean scenery with great sunsets and for those familiar with the "green flash", 3 nights consecutively. (Of course the alcohol intake would have nothing to do with that!) Our little corner of St. Croix had everything a diver could want. A 5 minute walk put us at an excellent, ocean-side, restaurant, another 100 yards sat a great breakfast place with the dive shop and beach 3 minutes beyond that.

Cane Bay has perhaps the most spectacular diving site on St. Croix. Just a 100 yard surface swim from the beach at Cane Bay Dive Shop puts a diver 60ft. down at the edge of a 13,000 foot wall which enlivens memories of "The Abyss". We had an open account with the shop, so we walked to it, picked up a tank and got wet. The Cane Bay wall was alive with life, swimming between house-size coral heads with sand swales separating these monsters. Visibility was 100 ft. and we took many pictures of sea horses, green turtles and myriads of tropical fish. My partner, Paul, later identified a strange noise as the crooning of a solitary

tied up in a "safe" location. The prospect of being on a boat, and I don't care how far up river, in what protective cove or lagoon one might be in, is easily a fatal decision. My advice to any divers on a trip during this season is to make sure you are not on a boat if the threat of a hurricane is imminent. Hurricanes do not sneak up on us. They usually are tracked and carefully monitored. Warnings are issued and there is almost always time enough to get to a safe land shelter.

If you are ever in a situation like the one that occurred in Belize, I urge you to make every effort to evacuate the boat and pursue an appropriate shelter well above sea level.




