President's Message: June, 2004

Dear Fellow Froggies and Friends,

It seems that Mother Nature has been having great fun at our expense lately; teasing us with sunny 80-degree days during the week, only to be followed by rainy, dreary weekends in the mid-40's!! Don't you just love New England weather? I have no doubt, however, that Summer will be upon us soon, and our excuses for not going diving will begin to evaporate like the perspiration from our brows. I am confident that there will be glorious Summer days ahead, with plenty of opportunities for some great diving. I am sure that several of you have been diving for some time now, and that a few of you have been diving all along straight through the Winter; all I can say is that you are an inspiration for those of us who have yet to take the plunge to start off the new season. Now that sea surface temps are slowly crawling out of the 40's and into the 50's, those of us who still dive wet (am I the only one left?) are raring to get back into the water again.

A few hardy souls braved water temps in the 40's during the annual Easter Egg Dive and Party held on April 25th. Those who dove that morning had a great deal of fun, with several great raffle prizes being awarded to those who exited the water with the most eggs. I am glad that the eggs were of the hard-boiled variety; I heard that the visibility was such that many of the eggs were lost at sea!! I am sure that all that yummy protein did not go to waste!!! The party at Dodie's house was in full swing when I arrived, with Froggies and their families occupying every square inch of the kitchen, and spilling out onto the patio and the yard beyond. The party was fun-filled, with great conversation supplemented by a mountain of tasty foods that kept pulling you back to taste some more, even when your brain tells you that you've already had enough. On May 6th, Bob Michelson from Stellwagen Bank National Marine Sanctuary and a marine scientist from the MA Audubon Society gave a great lecture on indigenous and introduced species of marine invertebrates that a diver might encounter in New England waters. This introduction to the identification of marine invertebrates

supplements previous years' Fish ID lectures, so that a diver can identify and census those creatures that he/she comes across during the course of a dive. In particular, the upcoming MA Biodiversity Day, held on June 6th in Newburyport, is a perfect opportunity to hone your marine critter ID skills, while at the same time collecting valuable census data which will be useful to marine scientists studying marine ecology and species abundance. Also, don't forget that the Great American Fish Count is scheduled for July 17th. The staging area will be in Stage Fort Park, but the Froggies have been chosen to census Old Garden Beach. We can have fun diving, while providing needed information which can be used to protect the environment that we enjoy so much. It doesn't get much better than that!! One more plug for MA Biodiversity Day: Bob Michelson has been granted the only dive permit EVER issued by the Parker River National Wildlife Refuge (Plum Island) to census within the refuge boundary; if you are interested in diving an area that is usually off limits to divers, here is your opportunity!!--and again, you help the cause of ocean education and protection to boot.

The Bay State Council of Divers met in Quincy on May 12th. Among the topics of discussion were the impending institution of bag limits on lobster caught by sport divers, and the feasibility of the establishment of artificial reefs (specifically the sinking of ships from the Navy's mothballed fleet) within Massachusetts waters. The topic of diver access issues to beach-entry dive sites on the North Shore was also addressed. If you are interested in any of these or other topics pertinent to the well-being of the diving community in MA, I strongly suggest that you consider attending a meeting of the Bay State Council of Divers; the organization was created by

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divers for divers to help protect the rights and voice the concerns of the diving public of the state. If you are interested in attending a meeting of the Council, please contact either myself or Mary Howard for details.

On May 22nd-23rd, I attended the DUI Demo Days held at Stage Fort Park despite the less-than-perfect weather. 

MASSACHUSETTS MARINE FISHERIES ADVISORY COMMISSION APPROVES NEW REGULATIONS

At a May 20, 2004 business meeting, the Marine Fisheries Advisory Commission (MFAC), approved Division of Marine Fisheries (DMF) proposals for new rules affecting recreational lobster fishing, commercial striped bass fishing, recreational scup fishing, wholesale dealer reporting, permitting for construction and repair of fishways, setting of lobster gear to protect right whales, and fishing for river herring along the Connecticut River. Most of these issues were discussed at May 3 & 4 public hearings.



Recreational lobster fishing (by pot and SCUBA divers) will be regulated under area-specific rules concerning the release of v-notched female lobster; minimum and maximum sizes; and trap escape vent minimum sizes. Also a state-wide 15 lobster daily bag limit was approved. Two management areas have been created: 1) Gulf of Maine Recreational Lobster Area and 2) Southeastern Recreational Lobster Area that generally coincide with the commercial management area boundaries. Since the May public hearings, DMF has amended the Southeastern Recreational Lobster Area boundaries to include nearshore waters around Provincetown. Regulations approved by area are listed in the table below. All regulations are effective July 2, 2004, except escape vent minimum size increases in the Southeastern Recreational Lobster Area, which will not go into effect until the 2005 season.


Lobstermen fishing in the Cape Cod Bay Critical Habitat during May to December are required to rig their gear with one of the configurations listed on the approved gear technology list (322 CMR 12.00). This regulation relaxes current requirements, while complementing current federal regulations. Regulation will be effective July 2nd.

No actions were taken on 1) the public petition to lower commercial lobster trap limit to 600 in state waters, 2) proposal to amend recreational cod possession limits, and 3) previous emergency action to restrict cod fishing in a portion of Massachusetts Bay. DMF staff will continue to work with the public and ASMFC, NEFMC, and NOAA Fisheries personnel to develop appropriate regulations for the lobster and cod fisheries.

Baffling disease makes lobsters look ugly

BOSTON -- A baffling disease that makes lobsters ugly, but not inedible, has crept northward from the Buzzards Bay hotspot where it's afflicted lobsters for several years.

The numbers of infected lobsters are far too tiny to cause panic, but the disease's progress is being eyed warily by regional researchers and lobstermen. The disease doesn't affect the meat, but a lobster with a corroded, blackened shell is a tough sell.

"You go and spend \$8 for a lobster, you want a goodlooking lobster," said Edward Heaphy, a lobsterman of 50 years from Dover, N.H.

In 1998, diseased lobsters began filling traps in the Buzzards Bay area, off the coast of southeastern Massachusetts. Almost a quarter of all lobsters sampled by the state in the bay that year had the disease, known as shell burn.

In the years since, the diseased lobsters were found in lesser numbers in Cape Cod Bay and Boston Harbor. Last year, according to preliminary numbers, 3 percent of lobsters caught off Salem and Cape Ann had the disease the first time since sampling began there in 2000 that any infected lobsters were recorded.

"We've seen, year by year, a slow, steady progression northward," said Bob Glenn, a biologist leading the coastal lobster studies at the state Division of Marine Fisheries.

Arthur Sawyer, a second generation Gloucester lobsterman, said he's spotted a couple diseased lobsters in the last year or two, but added, "You're still talking about nothing."

He said the disease is worth watching because of its mobility and unexplained cause.

"To say whether it's going to get worse or not, nobody knows," Sawyer said. "Those guys got creamed down there (in Buzzards Bay)."

The state's lobster catch was worth \$56.7 million in 2002, the most recent year for which statistics were available.

The shell disease hasn't been tied to any mass die-offs, and lobsters seem to survive it reasonably well, though perhaps in a weakened state, Glenn said.

The disease is caused by the chitinolytic bacteria that eats chitin, a cellulose-like substance in the shells. The disease

has been around forever, but the strain that's hit Buzzards Bay lobsters could be new and more virulent, Glenn said.

Other theories tie it to pollution, warmer coastal waters or some weakness in the lobsters. Glenn said that unless researchers find an easily contained cause of the disease say a leaking chemical pipe - nature will likely have to fix the problem.

"It's not like livestock where you could inoculate them," he said.

The disease has yet to significantly affect Maine - where fishery officials recorded a minuscule 44 cases of shell disease among 130,000 lobsters sampled in 2003 - or New Hampshire, where the disease turned up in 43 of 14,308 lobsters.

"Right now, I don't think it's anything to be concerned about," Heaphy said. "We're keeping our fingers crossed."




