From the President's Slate

Greetings to all my fellow divers!~

The other evening, during a typical channel surfing session, I came across CBS's "60 minutes". One of the segments (of course, always the LAST segment) was an interview with John Chatterton and Ritchie Kohler of U869 fame. During the interview, Chattererton was asked if it wasn't "dangerous" to be attempting something like diving on a wreck 230 feet below the sea. He responded, "Well, there is certainly a significant amount of danger relative to my diving activities, but, you know, you have to manage that".

That is basically what diving, and any sport, is all about. Managing danger; minimizing risks. Something as simple as playing softball can be dangerous. Take it from one who knows, a softball can produce a significant amount of blood on one's shirt after a direct hit on the nose! Does that stop me from playing? Nope. Also, some things don't go exactly as you had planned (for example, like this entire year). As long as the risks are managed and you have back up plans in place, any activity can be extremely enjoyable.

I have heard diving compared to flying an airplane. Both activities are done in very unforgiving environments but as long as your equipment is maintained and problems are addressed calmly and rationally, these activities are extremely rewarding.

This month, why don't you make it a point to approach someone you know and talk to them about diving? You may get the usual sharkphobia spasms or sweaty palms from the thought of being totally submersed. This is your chance to change that. Explain to them that there is truly a beautiful world

under there (even in typical New England visibility) and not experiencing that world because of "danger" or "risk" is truly a missed opportunity. Tell them they will be even more comfortable diving with people who know and love the sport and who will take the time to make sure that diving will be as rewarding to the new diver as it is for them.

You can tell this to them on the way to the Franco on a Thursday night after they land at Beverly airport.

September is a beautiful month for diving. The air is crisp and the nights are cool. We had a beautiful day for the annual Froggie picnic at Stage Fort Park in Gloucester. There are still plenty of good days left in the year to get wet and, for those lucky enough to own a dry suit (or be a REAL diver like Joe Terra!), the season can go a little longer.

EXTREME DIVING 101

Last month and into September I made a series of dives, (eight all together) at Carlson's Quarry in Rockport Massachusetts.

I first inspected this quarry approximately four years ago in the deep end in eighty-seven feet of water, but recently I hiked through the woods from Steel Derrick Quarry to a small flood control dam. Fully suited, in ninety-two degree weather, I went through "Shrek's" dismal swamp with hundreds of frogs and tadpoles as big as my fist jumping all over me as I trudged through a quarter mile to the site.

I finally was in four feet of water. At twenty feet, I did my first inspection of the dam. I was supposed to find a broken valve or door, but instead found a broken stopper plug, like you use in older sinks, (approximately twelve inches with a four inch hole in it.) After a new twelve

inch gate was installed downstream on the dry side of the dam, I could safely remove the stopper plug. I took measurements under water of the pipe and track system going from bottom to the top of dam. We fabricated a wooden mock-up of the gate and test fitted it on subsequent dives. We then made the gate out of steel plate and angle iron with an equalizing valve. This gate was installed and it leaked because of rubber gasket problems. We took it back out, installed a heavy duty

plug with an equalizing valve with a hold back system and then the gate was installed to insure protection.

The second dam inspection was done from a sixteen foot aluminum boat with a pump and Venturi system for cleaning around pipe. This area was seventeen to twenty feet down and was full of branches, leaves, mud and debris with visibility being approximately two inches with a light. There was a thermo-cline at seventeen feet, (five to ten degrees cooler than the sixty-five degree quarry water).

After the boat trip, which took all day to get into gear, go to site, run pump, try gate, take pictures etc., we decided that extreme diving was still easier. A typical dive day consisted of trucking gear to the lower dam, (Flat Ledge Quarry), three to five of us with gear and tools hiking over a ten inch plastic pipe, up a thirty-five degree slope for a third of a mile, then up a seventy to eighty degree slope to the dive site. I jumped off of the ledge into water and on the return trip, someone had to take the dive gear and equipment from me and then help me out of the water up a shear cliff three to five feet high. Then I would put the gear back on, hike over the dam again and then scale down an eighty degree slope to the roadway and back to the truck again to change.





I would have liked to take some pictures of the hike, but I had my hands full as it was. It was a very interesting dive because you are fortunate to be diving where you get paid and others are not allowed in. The different species that are there, frogs, tadpoles, and small fish are very curious and have no fear of you, so they get up front and personal.

There is a small train at the bottom of Flat Ledge Quarry which I would love to dive on, but there would need to be a problem there in order to have permission to dive. I hope that adventure is yet to come.

Last, but not least, I must commend Rockport's Town Mechanic, Bob Lucas, for his intuitiveness in getting things accomplished, where others wouldn't even try. Being a new diver himself, he was very enthusiastic during this whole ordeal. I would also like to mention John Joseph who works with me on a regular basis and is as loyal as one can ask.
