



Recipe Corner Lobster Salad

INGREDIENTS

1 pound fully cooked lobster meat, or 5 pounds live lobster
1 medium cucumber (5 to 6 ounces), peeled, seeded and finely diced
1/2 cup Mayonnaise or bottled mayonnaise
3 small scallions (white and most of the green parts), thinly sliced
Kosher or sea salt
Freshly ground black pepper

Steam or boil the lobsters. Let cool at room temperature. Remove the meat from the claws, knuckles and tails. Remove the cartilage from the claws and the intestine from the tails of the cooked meat. Cut the meat into 1/2-inch dice.

Place the cucumber in a colander for at least 5 minutes to drain the excess liquid.

Combine the lobster, cucumber and mayonnaise. If the salad is to be served within the hour, add the scallions. If not, add them 30 minutes before serving. Season with salt if needed and pepper. Cover with plastic wrap and chill for at least 30 minutes before serving.

But why should divers support Seamark, anyway? Besides being a fun night, and a great opportunity to swap dive stories and meet new dive buddies, Seamark helps lots of kids with disabilities. In the past 25 years, the Seamark Vision Clinic at Cotting School has supplied 700 pairs of eyeglasses, provided vision therapy to 900 children, examined more than 2,500 Cotting students, and repaired more than 15,000 pairs of eyeglasses.

Tuition at Cotting School (which is paid by the student's town, not the family) covers the basics at the School, but not the "extras" such as sports teams, adaptive equipment, and dental and vision services. The Seamark Vision Clinic is underwritten by the annual Seamark event, and without the event, there would be not clinic. Here are true stories (ok, the names have been changed), about how the Clinic has helped change two children's lives.

Joe is a 15 year old boy with a host of medical issues, including mitochondrial condition. One of the many issues associated with this rare condition is rapid fatiguing of his visual system. In the morning, Joe's vision is very good, but by lunchtime, he is legally blind. Joe has a very high prescription to assist with is vision, and also utilizes several pieces of adaptive equipment in the classroom. Because Joe is on megadoses of steroids to address some of his other medical issues, he is at high risk for developing glaucoma. Joe is tested for glaucoma in the Seamark Vision Clinic every six weeks.

Beth is a 9 year old girl with Downs Syndrome. Over the course of many communication therapy sessions, Beth's therapist noticed that she did not seem to be able to focus on her communication board. The therapist brought Beth to the Vision Clinic for testing, and sure enough, the optometrist discovered that Beth was very far sighted and also had a stigmatism. Beth received a prescription for reading glasses, and her therapists report a tremendous improvement in her up-close accuracy.

Cotting School serves 115 boys and girls from 65 towns throughout Massachusetts. The kids have a wide variety of physical, medical, learning, and communication challenges. Back in the Water

After a four-year pause from diving, I had wanted to get back in the water and finally made it happen this year. If you too are on the diving sidelines, yet can't stop being connected with the sport, you probably need to get back also. Here are some of the things I had to deal with.

My first obstacle in resuming diving was in my head. I'd missed the sport and had been coming to club meetings for some time. I had slipped into that category of members who come to meetings but don't ever seem to get wet. I was getting envious of divers telling of their latest exploits during the dive talk session of the weekly meetings. This became my quietest time each meeting. Many new members in the club began to know me but probably didn't see me as a diver. Older members may remember a time when I was always getting wet and couldn't shut up during "dive talk." This status can go on for weeks, months even years. If you don't slip away into oblivion as a non-diver, you are probably destined to return and will have to deal with similar thoughts and actions.

So here I was, four years older, a few pounds heavier, and having some feelings of doubt. I questioned whether I would find it as easy as I once had. Don't even think about that old wet suit. I finally decided that like riding a bike, diving would probably come back to me also.

So I finally dealt with the feelings and made the next move, back to the dive shop. Although some of the equipment has changed, most of it didn't interest me. Yes everyone seems to be using computers but I'm not interested in diving deep. For the same reason, I didn't need to investigate nitrox mixes and new tanks. I never was a cutting edge diver. I just wanted to get wet and do it safely and comfortably. My biggest item was a new wet suit. I already had a

dry suit, albeit an older one that didn't leak when it went into mothballs, if you will believe that. I could have pulled out the dry one but I always found diving awkward in that suit. In my head, I wanted to resume the experience as easily as possible. I knew I would be more comfortable wet.

Next came the tank inspections and hydros. Then my regulators and BC were overhauled and I got a new compass. I replaced a few of the small items like fin straps. I got a new belt for my lead weights and a new fangled snorkel. After a few trips to Bobby Boyle's shop, Undersea Adventures, and about \$750 I was functionally ready. If you want to get back in the water, you just have to bite the bullet and spring for it. Remember the enjoyment you had in the beginning and what it cost back then. The equipment I just upgraded will probably keep me going for quite a while.

The gear was all set but I was still lacking confidence. I had a few thoughts that I would feel awkward and have to learn all over. Although I'd done nearly a thousand dives in what seemed like a previous life, my mind was playing games with me. I could have taken a refresher course, but come on, I wasn't going to the Andrea Doria. I rationalized that an easy beach dive to a familiar spot with calm conditions would be fine.

In June, I decided to join the club on a Sunday morning dive. We met at Burger King then headed off to Old Garden Beach. Suiting up went well. It probably saved me some embarrassment that I checked all my gear and the adjustments the night before. In the water, everything started quite well. I had even remembered to wash my mask the night before with dish detergent. When they sit for an extended period, rubbing in even the strongest spit won't keep them from fogging. The only encounter that became a problem was my weights or lack of. A ten-inch diameter rock is

what "saved" my dive. I set it down at 40 feet, only to discover I was still positive. I managed to carry it like a football for the next 45 minutes. About five pounds heavier the next week, I no longer needed any rocks. I realized I had been right about it all coming right back. It was exactly as easy as I had remembered.

With a one and four year old, I may not make the water every week but I no longer have any doubts. If you too have been on the sidelines, I say, "Go for it."


