Dear North Shore Frogmen Members:


I have accepted the nomination of president of the North Shore Frogmen's Club in the upcoming election. Having been president of the club in 1987, I know what the position demands.

# **Recipe Corner**

#### PUMPKIN AND MUSSEL SOUP

1 (2 pound) pumpkin, seeds discarded, cut into cubes

Vegetable oil

2 tablespoons olive oil

1 cup finely chopped onion

1 teaspoon minced garlic

1 cup white wine

2 pounds mussels, scrubbed and debearded

5 cups vegetable or chicken stock

1 cup heavy cream

1 tablespoon finely chopped fresh chives Salt and pepper

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. First cook your pumpkin. In a bowl gently toss together the pumpkin cubes and a little vegetable oil. Place pumpkin on a baking sheet and roast for 15 minutes or until tender. Meanwhile, heat the 2 tablespoons of oil in a large stockpot, add the onion and garlic, cook for 3 minutes, stirring occasionally. Add the white wine and mussels, cover and steam for 4 minutes or so until the mussels just begin to open. Using a slotted spoon, remove only the mussels and allow them to cool. Then add the stock to the soup pot along with the roasted pumpkin. Bring to a boil, reduce the heat and simmer for 15 minutes. Meanwhile, remove the mussels from their shells and reserve all the juices. Using a hand held blender or transfer mixture to blender and then return to the stockpot, and puree the soup base. Now add the cream, chives, mussels, and their juices to the puree. Season to with salt and pepper and ladle into soup bowls

# Beach Clean Up Report Niles Beach September 23, 2000

My reasons for organizing the cleanup were two-fold. First, because I care about the environment. As a kid, I spent many a summer in cottages on the Annisquam River and enjoying afternoons at Long Beach and Good Harbor. Second, there is an uneasy tension between lobstermen and divers; both after the same quarry. I wanted to put divers in a positive light; that divers are not out to clean their traps. Divers can make a positive impact on the environment that supports the lobsterman's industry. I believe in a way each has something to offer the other.

When I first got there, I could see that there was at least 200 pounds of trash for the taking. Little did I know that by day's end, that number would be thoroughly "trashed." In fact, it was passed within the first hour! The first people who showed up were some local residents who were unaware that we were doing the clean up that day. They were very eager to join in and help out. We were joined by 24 students and teachers from the Ecology Club of Our Lady of Nazareth Academy in Wakefield. After showing everybody how to be a "Data Detective", they went out in search of all trash, large and small.

The debris they came up with was astounding. Of course, the perennial winner was the cigarette butt followed by cans, bottles, paper wrappers, plastic bags, clothing, fish nets and lines, on and on and on. We removed a large amount of driftwood. Lots of pieces of old piers, crates, and marine barrels.

Unfortunately, the Data Detectives did come across a dead seagull, which was trapped in monofilament fishing line. The geography of the area makes this beach act like a catch basin. The beach faces due south. You can see Boston straight out from the beach. Storms that come barreling up the coast push all the driftwood and anything else floating around out in the ocean up into this area.

That explains all the larger objects but there really is no excuse for the reams of man-made trash we cleared from the beach. Interesting to note, divers in the water accounted for less than 50 pounds of trash. Just the usual bottles and cans. This leads me to think that any trash that does come in doesn't have very much time to sink to the bottom Visibility was not good; 5 to 10 feet at best. Any trash that was found to be sustaining a colony of sea life was left to live on.

Bottom line for the day; CoastSweep 2000 at Niles Beach freed the beach of over 600 pounds of driftwood, tires, old chairs and signs. The volunteers "bagged" another 628 pounds of cups, butts, bottles, etc. making a grand total of 1,228 pounds of unwanted eyesore. A truly incredible effort!

Best thing was, during the day a security officer for a nearby private residence, windsurfers, surfcasters, and people who do nothing more than walk the beach came by to thank me profusely for spending the day clearing the beach. It was a great effort by a lot of people who decided to donate their Saturday for the environment.

The North Shore Frogmen who provided above and below water support and I, most of all, would like to offer my sincere appreciation for the Ecology Club of Our Lady of Nazareth Academy. I know without a doubt that the

world's ecology future is sound with young people like these getting involved. St. Francis would be proud!

Best line of the day: On a data card, submitted by a group of 10yr old girls who made the clean-up as part of their birthday party; on the entry "Length of beach cleaned", the reply was "All of it".

# **Annual Banquet**


The Annual Banquet will be held on Saturday, December 2, 2000 at the Franco American Club in Beverly.
